WHEREAS, the department planned for and budgeted for these hose additions in the FY23/24 Budget.



BACKGROUND:


Fire Department is implementing a change in the firefighting hose that are carried on fire apparatus. Intermediate size attack hose is ideal for use in residential and commercial applications and the Intermediate supply hose allows for maximizing water flow from fire hydrants and provides more efficient fire attack with portable deluge guns.

FINANCIAL IMPACT:

Funding for this would be from the Fire Department for \$39,466.00 in the FY 2023/24 Budget, account 42200-53451 Firefighting Tools.

Request: The City of Spring Hill is seeking a positive recommendation from the BOMA regarding the proposed Williamson County, City of Spring Hill Urban Growth Boundary.

Public Notice: The City of Spring Hill staff posted a newspaper add in a paper of general circulation within Williamson County in accordance with TCA notice requirements, as a form of best practice staff sent letters to each property effected by the proposed UGB, and the city developed a city webpage dedicated to the UGB process advertising the meeting.

The Planning Commission will hear this item on July 10, 2023.

The Board of Mayor and Alderman will hear this item on July 17, 2023.

Background Information

The City of Spring Hill, along with Williamson County, Brentwood, Fairview, Nolensville, Franklin, and Thompson's Station are all working to update the Williamson County Growth Plan. Spring Hill has evaluated its Urban Growth Boundary (UGB), which is a defined area beyond the city limits in which the City of Spring Hill could grow into overtime. The proposed Williamson UGB map as prepared by the UGB consultant is attached as exhibit A.

Williamson County's existing Growth Plan, was developed pursuant to the requirements of Public Chapter 1101, and was last adopted in April of 2001. The Growth Plan established UGBs around each of the six municipalities, as well as four Planned Growth Areas within the County. These growth boundaries have not been altered since their adoption in 2001. Each municipality is evaluating their own respective UGB and all proposed changes will be consolidated and considered for approval through a prescribed ratification process. The ratification occurs through the Local Government Planning Advisory Committee (LGPAC)



What is the purpose of updating the UGB?

The UGB should be reevaluated at least every twenty years to account for infrastructure improvements, market trends, growth patterns, and other changes that have occurred. The Urban Growth Boundary is a long-range planning tool to ensure cities are strategically planning to extend services as growth occurs. Additionally, the UGB thoughtfully identifies areas of future growth to ensure that the character and land uses developed within the exterior boundaries of the city do so in congruous manner with the City of Spring Hill.

How does this affect those in the proposed UGB?

Adoption of an updated Urban Growth Boundary, does not annex a property into the City of Spring Hill. An Urban Growth Boundary is identifying where future growth may occur over the course of the next 20 years. Annexation of any property within the UGB can only occur with the permission of the property owner and requires BOMA approval through a separate process. Ultimately the UGB is an overlay that identifies future growth areas and requires coordination between the County and the City when development occurs within the urban growth boundary.

Next Steps:

If the proposed Urban Growth Plan is approved (or ratified) by the City of Spring Hill Planning Commission and BOMA it will be submitted to the Local Government Planning Advisory Committee (LGPAC), housed in the Tennessee Department of Economic and Community Development, for approval.

Staff Recommendation:

Staff recommends that the Planning Commission favorably recommend the proposed UGB plan for BOMA to ratify and submit to the Local Government Planning Advisory Committee (LGPAC).



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
