

RESOLUTION 99-10


A RESOLUTION TO AUTHORIZE ENTERING INTO AN AGREEMENT WITH WILLIAMSON COUNTY FOR THE PERFORMANCE OF ANIMAL CONTROL SERVICES.

WHEREAS, Williamson County has requested that the Town of Spring Hill enter into an agreement with the County for the performance of Animal Control services; and

WHEREAS, the County has performed those services for the last two (2) years without compensation or an agreement in place and has now officially requested both

NOW, THEREFORE, Be It Resolved by the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the Town of Spring Hill, that an agreement for Animal Control Services at a cost of \$1,000.00 per year is hereby agreed to and the Mayor is hereby authorized to sign said agreement. Be It Further Resolved that payment in the amount of \$2,000.00 be made for fiscal years 1997-1998 and fiscal 1998-1999.

A RESOLUTION TO OPPOSE ANY ACT OF THE TENNESSEE STATE LEGISLATURE THAT WOULD REDUCE STATE-SHARED REVENUE CURRENTLY DISTRIBUTED TO MUNICIPALITIES

WHEREAS, the residents of the City of Spring Hill deserve, demand and depend upon essential city services; and

WHEREAS, the services provided by the City of Spring Hill have fostered and maintained a high quality of life for residents of the City of Spring Hill and surrounding areas; and

WHEREAS, the continued fiscal health and vitality of the City of Spring Hill, in its role as an educational and economic hub, is critically important to the entire region and to the State of Tennessee as a whole; and

WHEREAS, state-shared taxes distributed to the City of Spring Hill, when coupled with locally generated revenue, enable the Board of Mayor and Aldermen to provide such deserved and demanded services; and

WHEREAS, to ensure the continued health, safety and prosperity its residents, the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Spring Hill could not in good conscience cut the essential services that are now provided with the support of state-shared revenues, including the Hall Income tax; and

WHEREAS, if the state removed state-shared revenues from localities, to solve the state's budget problem the City of Spring Hill's municipal property tax rate would have to increase by approximately _____ per \$100 of assessed valuation; and

WHEREAS, property owners of the City of Spring Hill would pay increased municipal property tax rates in addition to an increase in Williamson County's property tax rate of approximately _____ per \$100 of assessed valuation and Maury County's property tax rate of approximately _____ per \$100 of assessed valuation; and

WHEREAS, the Tennessee General Assembly may consider the repeal of long-standing state-shared revenues to solve the state budget

problem; and

WHEREAS, the City of Spring Hill recognizes the seriousness and importance of the state's current budget problems, but also recognizes that shifting the state's budget problem to local governments would be detrimental to the vitality and continued prosperity of the State of Tennessee;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Spring Hill firmly oppose the use of local governments' state-shared revenue distributions to solve the state budget problem; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Spring Hill appreciate the efforts of our state representative and state senator as they work to ensure that existing city services can be continued without a near-doubling of municipal property tax rates.
