A RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE MAURY COUNTY
ELECTION COMMISSION TO CONDUCT AN ELECTION
WITHIN THE CORPORATE BOUNDARIES OF THE TOWN
OF SPRING HILL ON APRIL 10, 1997 TO ELECT ONE
ALDERMAN FOR EACH OF THE FOUR WARDS PURSUANT
TO THE ELECTION LAWS OF THE STATE OF TENNESSEE


BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF MAYOR AND ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF
SPRING HILL, TENNESSEE that:

1. The Maury County Election Commission be authorized and requested to conduct the regular municipal election for the Town of Spring Hill, Tennessee on Thursday, April 10, 1997, for the purpose of electing an Alderman from each of the four wards, all from the Town at large, each for a term of four years. The Commission is requested to publish notice of the election in Maury County and Williamson County.

2. Early voting shall include the following Saturdays: March 22 and March 29, 1997. To facilitate a better turnout, the Maury County Election Commission is requested to hold early voting at Spring Hill Town Hall, with the Town bearing the extra cost of a dedicated telephone line.

3. The Mayor is hereby authorized to request the Maury County Election Commission to hold the April 10, 1997 election, the cost of which will, by law, be borne by the Town of Spring Hill.



Here are some recent attorney general opinions:

1. *Dissolution of Sports Authority of Memphis and Shelby County*. The Sports Authority of Memphis and Shelby County may be dissolved by its board of directors or by resolution of both the Memphis City Council and the Shelby County Commission. O.T.A.G. 96-128 (Nov. 17, 1996).
2. *Filing nominating petitions for municipal elections for cities located in more than one county*. T.C.A. § 2-5-104, which requires candidates to file certified duplicate nominating petitions with the county election commission in all counties wholly or partially within the area served by the office the candidate seeks, applies to municipal elections for cities located in more than one county. If a candidate fails to file duplicate petitions in all counties served by the municipal position, the candidate's name cannot be permitted on any official ballot. O.T.A.G. 96-129 (Nov. 12, 1996).
3. *Applicability of Sunshine Law to Maury County Regional Airport Authority*. The Sunshine Law, or Open Meetings Act, applies to meetings of the commissioners of the Maury County Regional Airport Authority and to meetings of the Maury County Regional Airport Authority Advisory Board. O.T.A.G. 96-131 (Nov. 14, 1996).
4. *Constitutionality of proposed "Home Improvement Property Tax Refund" in city of Memphis*. The proposed "Home Improvement Property Tax Refund" program of the city of Memphis, which would provide participants a refund of their property taxes equal to the amount paid on home improvements, is unconstitutional. This scheme would create an exemption from property taxes that is not specifically authorized by the constitution to be exempted, and the proposed refund would impose a different tax rate on separate properties in violation of the Equal and Uniform Clause. O.T.A.G. 96-133 (Nov. 18, 1996).
5. *Application to special school district superintendents of statute prohibiting school superintendents from taking other positions*. T.C.A. § 49-2-301(g), which makes it a Class C misdemeanor for any school superintendent to take any other position or contract under the board of education, applies to superintendents of special school districts. O.T.A.G. 96-135 (Nov. 22, 1996).
